What's Wrong with "Church"?

Professing Christians are leaving the institutional church en masse, and not only that, what is left of the institutional church is provoking cultural anti-Christian sentiment as never before. What is left of the evangelical church is leaving smaller buildings, conglomerating in larger assemblies, and thereby claiming "revival." These assemblies and their massive infrastructure are indeed impressive, but out of sight are the disenfranchised who dared to ask questions about this supposed "gospel recovery."

In Against Church, Paul Dohse makes the case that "church" is what's wrong with church. The etymology of the word marries it to an institution that is really anti-Christian. Believers and unbelievers alike resent an institution that has hijacked Christian identity and misrepresented it in every way, and worse yet, the disenfranchised do not think there is an alternative.

But there is an alternative. The answer is a return to true Christianity plainly described in the pages of the New Testament. In this book, Dohse removes the blinders of orthodoxy and makes a case from an exegetical approach to the Scriptures and history.

This approach reveals a glorious hope of a loving assembly rejoicing in the abundant life of Jesus Christ.
